

Dear Colleagues,

Last Friday's pre-charette call was enormously helpful in identifying examples of work and generating a set country criteria for joint work within a Post-2015 shared framework. If you weren't among the 50+ participants on Friday's call, don't worry - you can find the [discussion notes](#) on the Souk. Coming out of last week's planning call, we now want to be sure that all relevant work is considered in the next phase of deliberations. Based on inputs received to date, we have started tracking patterns of OSF's Post-2015 advocacy activities, as well as our on-the-ground work in specific countries and on specific Post-2015 goals. To sharpen this network map of Post-2015 activities, we are hoping you will provide us with some more detailed information about any existing or anticipated work that your foundation, program, or office is doing in specific countries or regions in the areas of *governance, safety, justice, and rule of law*^[1].

To assist you in supplying this information, we have created a [Summary Sheet](#) (also attached) that requests brief, specific information on your project. Given our tight timeline, we are aiming to collect this information from interested parties by this **Friday, January 31**^[2]. If you prefer, we are available by phone to fill out the form with you and a member of our team will be reaching out to you in the next few days to follow up on this note. We will collect and synthesize the information we receive into a cross-cutting analysis of current and proposed work on Post-2015 goals related to governance, safety, justice and rule of law. This discovery will inform a series of subgroup discussions starting Tuesday and continuing over the following ten days to prepare strategic inputs for the charette, including a prioritized list of potential focus countries and initial proposed collaborations,

^[1] As reported on our call, the Global Board approved the nominated Post-2015 concept to move to a charette with a focus on goals related to justice, governance, safety and rule of law. Within the High Level Panel Report, the specific goals that related to these issues are # 10 and #11 (see below). If you are doing work that addresses more traditional development goals such as health or education but that also aligns within a governance, safety, justice or rule of law frame please do let us know.

GOAL 10

ENSURE GOOD GOVERNANCE AND EFFECTIVE INSTITUTIONS



- a) Provide free and universal legal identity, such as birth registrations
- b) Ensure that people enjoy freedom of speech, association, peaceful protest and access to independent media and information
- c) Increase public participation in political processes and civic engagement at all levels
- d) Guarantee the public's right to information and access to government data
- e) Reduce bribery and corruption and ensure officials can be held accountable

GOAL 11

ENSURE STABLE AND PEACEFUL SOCIETIES



- a) Reduce violent deaths per 100,000 by x and eliminate all forms of violence against children
- b) Ensure justice institutions are accessible, independent, well-resourced and respect due-process rights
- c) Stem the external stressors that lead to conflict, including those related to organized crime
- d) Enhance the capacity, professionalism and accountability of the security forces, police and judiciary
