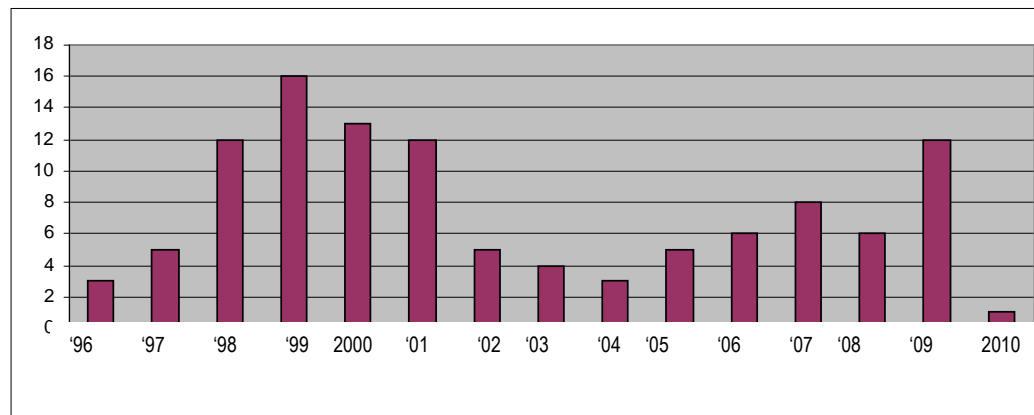

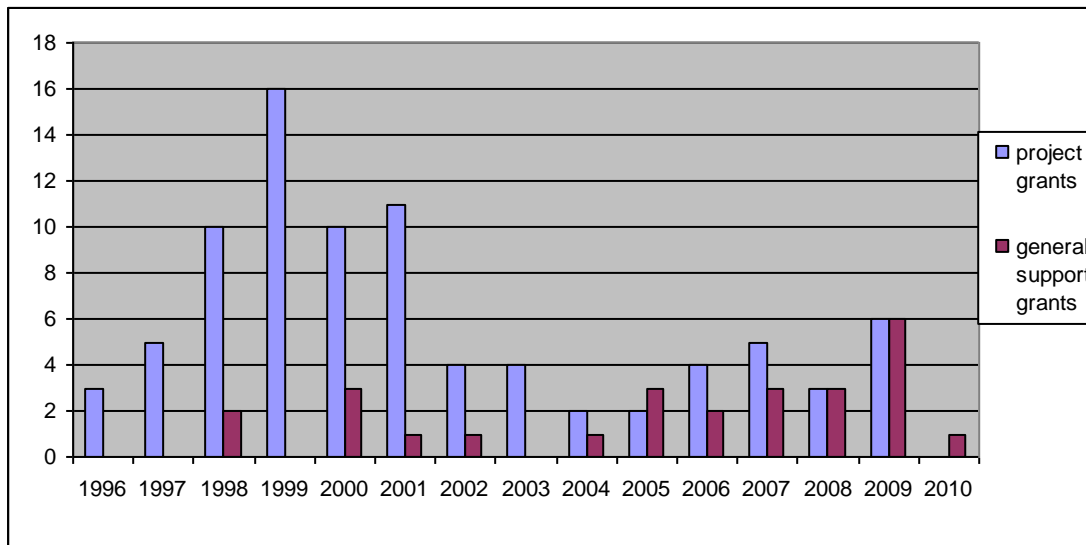

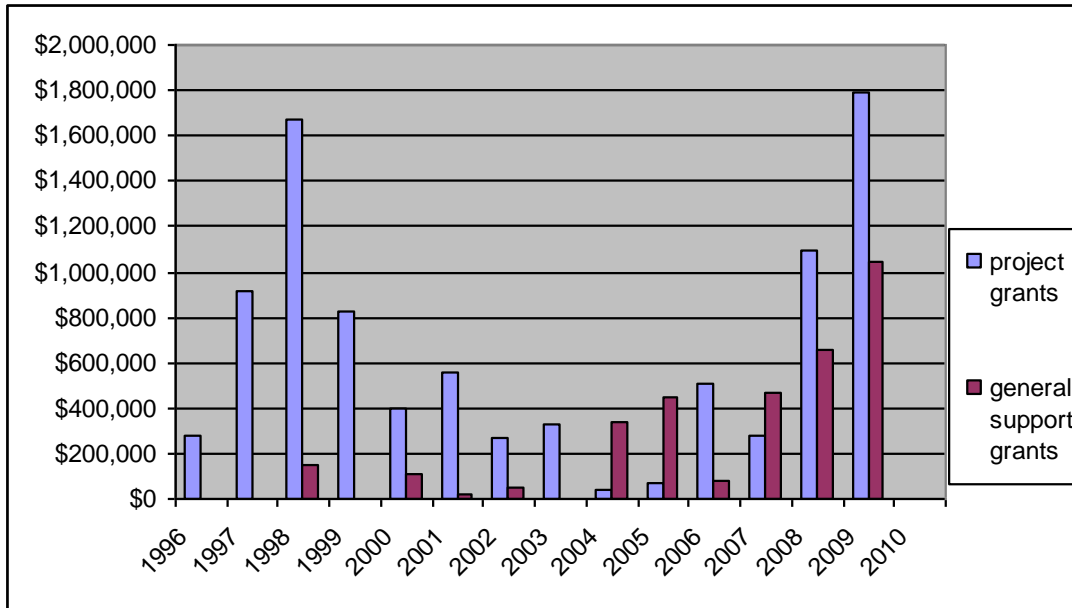

- Most grants were made in the period 1998-2001 (53 grants amounting \$3.8 million).
- Grants focused heavily on criminal and other justice-related issues (including death penalty, re-entry, sentencing reform, and judicial independence) and on immigration related issues, with a few number of grants for projects on drug policy, youth and arts, community organizing and reproductive health.
- The number of grants decreased in period 2002-2004 and started spiking again in 2005. The focus continues on criminal justice throughout this period and into the period 2006 -2008, with a few grants on journalism, immigration and drug addiction.
- Grant making peaks again in 2009 (12 grants were given that year, amounting to \$2.8 million), with continued heavy emphasis on criminal justice and a few grants on immigration and census-related work.
- 112 grants were given in the period 1996-2010 for \$12.9 million.
- During that same period, USP made 85 project grants for \$9.34 million and 26 general support grants for \$3.56 million. The number of general support grants started increasing in 2005 and, in 2009, USP made the same number of project and general support grants (7 of each).



- The amounts given as general support grants also increased consistently:



- The amounts given (through either project or general support) to the most funded issues were:

- Criminal justice: \$6,339,470
- Immigration issues: \$2,040,000
- Drug policy issues: \$775,000

Other issue areas funded included:

- Youth (arts and media issues)
- Community organizing
- Journalism/media
- Economic recovery
- Census work
- Palliative care

Finally, USP gave grants to 44 grantees. 48% of these grantees received more than one grant.
